4.2.History

Gaziantep Engineering Faculty was first established in 1973 as an extension campus of Middle East Technical University (METU). Gaziantep Engineering Faculty, where the medium of instruction is English, is the basis of the University of Gaziantep.

Gaziantep University became an independent state university on 27th June, 1987. Gaziantep Engineering Faculty and Gaziantep Vocational School of Higher Education, which were in the

body of Middle East Technical University (METU), were connected to the University of Gaziantep by the same law. In addition to them, the Faculties of Medicine, Arts and Sciences, Economic and Administrative Sciences, Education in Adıyaman; Vocational School of Higher Education in Kilis, Graduate Schools of Natural and Applied Sciences, Social Sciences, and Health Sciences and the State Conservatory of Turkish Music were established.

Presently, education/instruction is maintained at 16 faculties, four higher schools, 11 vocational schools of higher education, five graduate schools and five service departments to offer a variety of courses in 107 major areas at undergraduate and graduate level.

4.3.Mission

Our mission is to be a university which is open to changes and educates qualified individuals within universal values, serves individuals, society and all institutions and organisations in education, science, art and health fields.

4.4.Vision

Our vision is to be a world university which has high international competition ability in educational and scientific activities.

4.5.Basic Values

We are committed to ethical values, co-production, respect for diversity and expertise; innovation and creativity; openness, efficiency and productivity in resource use; sustainable improvement, stakeholder orientation, perfectionism, civic sensitivity, and process orientation.

5. SCHOOL OF FOREIGN LANGUAGES

The School of Foreign Languages provides preparatory English education for students enrolled in the Faculties of Engineering, Medicine, Architecture, Aeronautical Engineering, Economics and Administration, Sociology as well as the Departments of English Language Teaching, and English Language and Literature. Moreover, engineering, aeronautical engineering, medicine, communication, and health services students are educated in accordance with their professional areas. Our school also provides courses as distance education for students in the Faculty of Science and Letters, Health Services Vocational School, Higher School of Physical Education, and Conservatory during their freshman year. We design our courses according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR) standards including four basic language skills (reading, writing, listening and speaking).

5.1.Our Mission

Our mission is to provide our Turkish and foreign students with contemporary education and to aid them in acquiring basic English language skills so they are better able to do the following:

• to express themselves in different environments in which English is used as a means of communication,

- to carry out and evaluate their academic studies effectively,
- to use English for professional purposes.

5.2.Our Vision

Our vision includes the following:

- to improve the quality of foreign language education programs used in all units of the School of Foreign Languages,
- to provide our students with both in-and-out of class activities so that they can organize their studies effectively in independent environments,
- to develop our school into a more qualified educational institution for our country.

5.3. Aims and Objectives

The academic and administrative staff of the SFL works in a professional and friendly atmosphere in order to provide our students with the best education possible.

With its highly qualified and enthusiastic teaching staff, the SFL aims to:

- guide students to learn and use all the language skills effectively and productively,
- endow learners with effective education in all four language skills,
- provide language education that students can make use of both at their departments and in their day to day lives,
- integrate technology into our in-class teaching and self-study,
- prepare the necessary foundation for our students to communicate in the target language,
- keep a close eye on our systems and processes to see how we can improve the courses and/or services we offer.

5.4.SFL English Preparatory Program

5.4.1. Medium of Instruction in Departments

Gaziantep University is an English-medium university for the following faculties and departments: Engineering, Architecture, Medicine, Aeronautics and Astronautics, Sociology, English Language Teaching, and English Language and Literature. In addition, preparatory education is optional in the Faculty of Economic and Administrative Sciences.

In order to fulfil the requirements of the SFL successfully, students can take the Exemption Exam held at the beginning of each academic year, or they can submit one of the following certificates proving their level of proficiency.

5.4.2. SFL Exemption Exam

The Exemption Exam determines whether a student's knowledge of English is eligible enough to go to his faculty/departmental courses and pursue his academic studies. Students who fail this exam are required to attend English preparatory classes (according to the regulations set forth by a decree published on August 21st, 2017, concerning the examination and evaluation of students in Associate's degree and undergraduate degree programs at Gaziantep University).

5.4.3. SFL Placement Exam

Our students are placed in the following levels according to the results of the Placement Exam:

- Level A1
- Level A2
- Level B1

5.4.4. Course Hours and Absenteeism

Contact hours and module absenteeism limits are as follows:

As seen above, in all groups *the excused and unexcused absenteeism limit* for each module is 30 hours.

Students who fail a module due to absenteeism cannot take any further exams in that module and they must repeat that module. Exam grades earned prior to their failure due to absenteeism are added to the module average. Students who exceed the 80-hour limit in a term fail the preparatory class. Students who fail due to absenteeism may continue to attend classes; however, they cannot take any exams following the date of failure. Students' medical reports and official permits are evaluated by administration at our school, who decide whether students are eligible to take make-up exams or are exempted from their absenteeism (according to a regulation regarding Gaziantep University's Associate's degree and Bachelor's degree education and principles of exam and evaluation, Article 11). The relevant medical reports and official permits must be submitted to the SFL Student Affairs Office within three working days following the due-date.

5.4.5. SAC (Online Self Access Center) and e-registration System

Technology is an indispensable part of our modern life and learning a language is not an exception. Students at the SFL are expected to make use of technology in terms of a system called Self Access Center (SAC). Students are given an orientation on how to use the system at the beginning of the academic year. Students are required to do the task on the system according to the deadline announced on the system since they are graded on their performance at the end of each module.

E-registration is a system through which students can reach their absenteeism, exam scores, student evaluation, module average, and yearly preparatory program passing grades. Usernames and passwords are provided by their instructors at the beginning of the academic year. Through the academic year, students are expected to keep a track of their information on the system. 5.4.7. SFL Assessment Policy


5.4.7.1. The Evaluation of In-year Achievement

Language education at the SFL is provided via a modular system in accordance with the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). These modules are as follows:




- Each module lasts 7-8 weeks.
- The passing grade for each level is 60/100.

The module average is calculated as follows:



- Student evaluation grade is given by the instructors of each class according to a set of certain criteria (see Appendix 1).
- A student who does not obtain at least a grade of 60 at the end of a module must repeat the module.
- The in-year grade consists of the average grade of the four modules.
- Students who have completed Module B1 can take the final exam at the end of the academic year.
- 50% of the in-year average and 50% of the final exam grade are taken into account to evaluate a student's "Preparatory Year Achievement Grade".



5.4.7.2. The Evaluation of Overall Grade: Pass/Fail

Overall Assessment for Preparatory Class

Group1: The minimum passing grade for English Language Teaching and English Language and Literature students (whose medium of instruction is English) is 70.

Group2: The minimum passing grade for students enrolled in the Faculties of Engineering, Architecture, Aeronautics and Aerospace, and Medicine (whose medium of instruction is English) is 65.

Group3:The minimum passing grade for students enrolled in the Economics and Administrative Sciences Faculty (whose medium of instruction is Turkish) is 60.

- Students who fail due to absenteeism during the year cannot take final or make-up exams and they cannot attend Summer School.
- Students who complete the course and obtain at least an average grade of 50 during the year can take final and make-up exams.
- Students who have a minimum yearly achievement grade average of 45 have the right to register for summer school.

- Students who fail to pass the preparatory program might re-take the Exemption Exam in September alongside students who have just been registered. If they fail this exam, they repeat English preparatory program at the SFL. However, students who want to take exemption and final/make-up exams without attending the program must apply to the SFL with a petition within the add/drop dates at the beginning of the year. Moreover, those students cannot attend Summer School.
- Students who fail to pass the preparatory program within the maximum time limit are dismissed from the ÖSYM-placed programs.
- Students who fail may be placed in a Turkish medium equivalent program upon their application to ÖSYM.

5.4.7.3. Exams

Quizzes


In each module, students have four quizzes. Three of these quizzes consist of listening, language use (vocabulary and grammar), and reading parts which are designed in accordance with the objectives given in the pacing schedule. The other quiz assesses the students' writing and speaking skills. This quiz grade is earned from the Portfolio File that students compose in each module. In this file, students write two portfolio items which are evaluated in terms of quality and quantity and two speaking projects.

Module Exit Exams

- Exit exams are administered at the end of each module. Exam dates are announced together with pacing schedules at the beginning of the academic year. If necessary, the announced exam dates may be changed by the administration.
- Exit exams consist of reading comprehension, listening, writing, speaking, and language use (vocabulary and grammar).


Final Exam:

A final exam is administered at the end of the academic year. The exam consists of the following three stages:



Exemption Exams:

Three exemption exams are administered during each academic year on the dates indicated in the academic calendar. Students who have registered or have failed the previous year can take this exam at the beginning of the academic year. Students who complete B1 level with an average of at least 85 and students who complete B2 level successfully can take the exemption exams given at the end of the second and third modules. Exemption exams are given in the following three sessions:



Students who obtain a score of 55 or above from the first session of the exam may take the second and third sessions. The passing grade for the proficiency exam is 70 for students in the Departments of English Language Teaching, and English Language and Literature; 65 for students in the Faculties of Engineering, Architecture, and Medicine; and 60 for students in the Faculty of Economics and Administrative Sciences.

Assessment Process

Listening, Language Use and Reading parts of the exams (exit, exemption, and final) are graded through a computerized optical system.

For the speaking part, two instructors assess the learner at the same time with a set of certain criteria (see Appendix 2). The average grade of these two assessors' grades is the final one.

For the writing part, a double-blind marking process is applied. Two different instructors assess the same paper without seeing each other's grades using a set of certain criteria (see Appendix 3). If there is a difference of more than 20 points between two graders, appeals board assesses the paper and the average of all three grades is taken. Apart from this, if the students have a completely irrelevant content (off-topic), their paper will not be evaluated and their final grade will be 10 points. The following rubric is used for assessment:

Appeals Board

Appeals Board is a group of instructors assigned by the administration in order to reassess the objections. If the students are not content with their grades, they can write a petition to have their exam papers re-evaluated (see Appendix 4 for a sample petition form).

Announcement of the Exam Results

The results of the quizzes are announced on e-registration system (<u>https://obs.gantep.edu.tr/oibs/ogrenci/login.aspx</u>) and by the instructors of the class. Students are allowed to see their papers, but not allowed to take photos or take them away.

Exit Exam results are announced on the webpage of our school (www.ydyo.gantep.edu.tr).

General Information about Exams

- Students are required to have their student ID cards and identity documents (citizenship card, driving license, or passport) with them during exams.
- Students are required to switch their mobile phones off before exams begin. They are also required to submit their mobile phones to the responsible proctor during exams; otherwise, students are considered as having cheated. In the case of disciplinary action regarding this matter, the Higher Education Student Discipline Regulations (articles 5/d, 7/e and 8/d) are applied.
- Exam seating arrangements may be organized by the responsible proctor.
- Students are not allowed to enter the examination room later than thirty minutes after the start of the examination.
- The attempt/acts of cheating, assisting cheating, cheating on a threat, preventing students who cheat from being taken out of the classroom, and impersonating rightful test takers are considered as having committed a crime according to the corresponding acts of the Higher Education Student Discipline Regulations.

5.4.8. Summer School

- Students who have a Yearly Achievement Grade of 45 or above are entitled to attend summer school, though it is not mandatory.
- Students are supposed to pay the tuition and register for summer school.
- The amount of the tuition is determined by the Students' Registrars' Office and announced online.

- Students who exceed 80 hours of absenteeism in one semester cannot register for summer school.
- Summer school starts on the date announced in the Academic Calendar (<u>http://bimlinux.bim.gantep.edu.tr/~ogrenci/ogrenci_isleri/akademik_takvim.html</u>).
- Attendance is obligatory at summer school. Those who have exceeded the absenteeism limit do not have the right to take any exams including the final exam.
- The Summer School final grade is calculated as follows:



5.4.9. Academic Staff

The academic staff at our school consists of numerous qualified instructors. The academic staff list is available on the SFL webpage. Students can consult their instructors regarding academic and other issues during the given office hours.

5.4.10. Issues Regarding Student Disciplinary Actions

Learning to think and work independently is part of the educational process. Cheating or plagiarism in any form is considered a serious violation of expected student behaviour and may result in disciplinary action. The SFL policy can be summarized simply: students are responsible for their own work and actions.

They offer the possibility for students to express themselves and to share their experiences with their friends. 

5.4.14. Important Remarks for Students

- Pay attention to the orientation session which is given on the first day of the academic year. You can also examine it on the webpage of the SFL. (<u>http://ydyo.gantep.edu.tr/?dil=en</u>)
- Evening class students and students who repeat the preparatory school education have to pay tuition at the beginning of each semester. The liability of this issue is on the student, not the school.
- Always remember that you need to be cautious and respectful in your relationships with your instructors and friends.
- It is compulsory that you carry your student ID card with you and show it to the security personnel when claimed.

- Do not give your student ID card to anyone in any way; in such a case, a discipline investigation will commence.
- As a precaution towards the possibility of loss or theft, do not leave your bags, wallets, books, mobile phones, and/or any other valuable items in the classroom. Neither Gaziantep University nor the School of Foreign Languages are responsible for lost or stolen property.
- Smoking is forbidden in the building, in enclosed spaces, in corridors, in toilets, and in classrooms.
- Selling things like food, clothes, or books on the campus is prohibited.
- You are not allowed to enter offices or other unused classrooms.
- Banners or announcements can be posted on notice boards only after permission is obtained from the Rector's Office or the relevant department and after informing the administration of the School of Foreign Languages.
- The school buildings and surrounding area should be kept clean, and fixtures must be treated with care.
- During course hours, you are able to participate in conversations, conferences, and meetings, and you may participate in activities at GAUN within your own responsibilities; however, you will be signed absent during the lessons you do not attend.
